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# epiclccorr

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#### Abstract

The aim of this task is to correct EPIC source time series.

# 3 Description

The aim of this task (**epiclccorr**) is to correct *EPIC* source TS produced by **eveselect** for the following effects:

- Absolute Corrections: Corrections due to events lost through inefficiencies of various sorts in the mirror-detector system. We will consider these corrections as energy dependent:
  - Vignetting
  - Bad pixels
  - Chip gaps
  - PSF
  - Quantum Efficiency

This will give the Count Rate which would have been detected by this camera with this filter, if it had been observed on-axis with an infinity extraction radius. As such the final Count Rates may be converted to fluxes using tools such as PIMMS.

• Relative Corrections: Corrections which vary with time:

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- Dead Time.
- GTIs.
- Exposure.
- background counts.

#### • Background Substraction:

Optionally, an *EPIC* background TS can be supplied and in this case the initial source TS will be also background corrected (**backscale** correction included ). The first version of **epiclccorr** will only accept background TS with exactly the same start and stop time and bin size as in the source TS. The background TS will be corrected for relative effects related to the geometrical area of the source TS. The results of the background corrected rates and errors are stored in columns BACKV and BACKE in the output file. Bear in mind that a big background area will slow down epiclccorr run.

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epiclccorr also needs as input the event file used to create both source and background time series.

epiclccorr will perform the Absolute corrections making use of the arfgen and evselect SAS tasks. A broad energy spectrum (50 eV energy bin) will be created using the Data SubSpace (DSS) expressions and it will be passed to arfgen SAS task. This task takes calibration information provided by the CAL, performs the necessary corrections for instrumental factors, such us, Vignetting, Bad Pixels, Chip Gaps, PSF, filter transmission, Quantum Efficiency, to get the corresponding Absolute Correction for the source TS. If the extraction region is too complex, arfgen can fail trying to calculate the source position from the DSS. In this case, the withsourcepos parameter must be used, and the user must introduce the source coordinates.

**epiclccorr** output also contains the following extensions:

- SRC\_GTIS. This extension contains GTIs which cover all the non-null RATE values.
- BKG\_GTIS. This extension (only present if withbkgset='yes') contains GTIs which cover all the non-null BACKV values.

**epiclccorr** is also compatible with the output of **barycen** task.

The following corrections will not be included in the first version:

- source spectrum time variability.
- Out of Time Events.
- pileup.

The **relative corrections** will be performed by designing and coding specific algorithms for each instrument *EPICMOS* and *EPICPN* and each mode. A detailed description can be found in section ??.

## 3.1 Extraction region over more than one CCD

In cases where users select an extraction region over more than one CCD, the algorithm to correct TS changes completely. We have to deal with light curves coming from different detectors and therefore, we

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have to take into account all possible detector problems for each CCD. The key point in these cases is to calculate the effective area per CCD that it is being used in the extraction region.

We make a per CCD correction assuming that the counts come from a point source. If one of the CCDs contain a significan background contribution, then this algorithm wont be right. Because of this, we encourage users to apply background subtraction in order to perform all corrections properly.

epiclcorr corrects the TS using the following algorithm.

- Create a TS for each CCD.
- Correct background TS.
- Subtract background.
- Calculate an effective time per bin taking into account the effective area of the source region for each CCD.
- Calculate corrected rate and errors.

If the user does not apply background subtraction, the source TS correction could overestimate the background contribution in cases where background counts are higher or similar to the source counts.

#### 3.2 Absolute Corrections

The first version of **epiclccorr** will be optimised to correct time series extracted from **point sources**. The **Absolute Correction** will be finally applied to the corrected source TS background substracted.

A coarse spectrum (50 eV bins) will be produced by **evselect** from the source region, over the energy range used in the constructions of the TS. This will be used with **arfgen** to find the effective area array for the source as a function of photon energy.

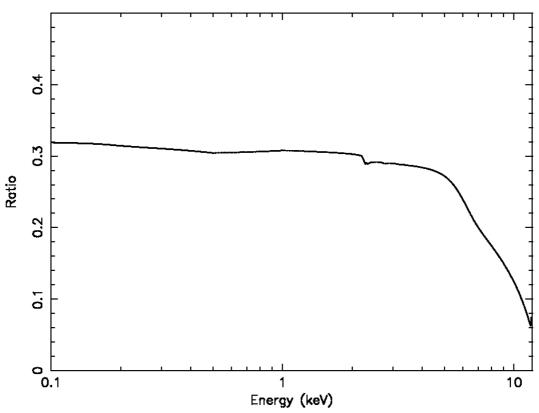
**arfgen** will be executed twice; The fist call with the spectrum in the real position (off-axis) and with the standard default parameters.

A second call to arfgen using the parameters ( $with source pos=yes\ source coords="tel"\ source x=0\ source y=0\ filter dss=no\ with det bounds=yes\ with bad pix corr=N\ modelee=N\ det map type=flat\ det xbins=1\ det ybins=1)$  will calculate the ideal effective area of this camera/filter combination with no losses.

By dividing the effective area, returned by **arfgen** for an infinite on-axis extraction region by the effective area returned from the actual extraction region, we will obtain an array of absolute corrected factors (Fig.see figure 3.2:). These will be weighted by the source spectrum to find a single absolute correction factor.







we show the ratio of an off-axis (aprox. 10 arcmin) vs. on-axis ARF values with respect to the energy. The ratio remains almost constant up to 4 keV.

## 3.3 Relative Corrections

epiclccorr will treat all these corrections individually, developing and designing specific algorithms to correct the **Relative Corrections**.

GTIs correction will be calculated using the GTI extensions located in the time series file, if any. Otherwise, the STDGTI will be used to calculate the GTIs corrections. Collection regions overlapping more than one ccd will be treated using the GTI of each CCD.

**Exposure** correction is the time inside each frame where the CCD is taking data correctly (no counting or MIP problems). This correction will be calculated using the values of the FRACEXP column in the EXPOSUnn extension. Being FRACEXP the effective time fraction of each frame.

**Dead Time** correction is the time where the CCD is not active (CCD read out time). This correction will be calculated using the *Live Time* and *Frame Time* values of each mode.

The EXPOSUnn extension, together with the keywords FRMTIME, TIMEDEL, etc... will be used to calculate the **Dead Time** correction.

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## EmptyGTIList (error)

No GTI found to the corresponding CCD.

#### ZeroAreaCorrection (error)

Sum of all CCD areas is empty. Please check your source and background expression.

#### EmptyGTI (error)

GTI extension empty.

#### BinSizeTooSmall (error)

Light curve bin size smaller than frame time.

#### CCDs Count Difference (warning)

A difference in the sum of the counts of single CCDs, with respect to the counts of the original light curve, has been found.
